### **Course Description**

Examination of the history and current developments, structures, functions, and importance of the international food and agricultural industry; issues, concerns and interrelationships and their impacts on American agriculture and society.

### **Course Objectives**

To explore relevant facets of our food system linked to the urban and rural landscape including West Virginia. By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the food and agricultural industry including:
  - List basic facts about the history, developments, structures, concerns, and interrelationships of the international food and agricultural industry;
    - Explain the interrelationships between agriculture and human existence;
    - o Relate the importance of agriculture in our everyday life; and
    - Discuss issues currently affecting agriculture around the world.
- Establish and explain relationships between knowledge of the agricultural industry and its problems and problems, ideas, and values of contemporary society
- Explain the agricultural industry and its problems from the historical, cultural, and or political perspective of western and non-western nations/regions.
- Demonstrate an understanding of methods of critical thought and principles of scholarly inquiry as they explore agricultural industry issues.
