PHIL 130: Current Moral Problems

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Course Description and Expected Outcomes:

We make decisions of moral importance every day. Such decisions present a challenge: what is the morally right thing to do? What is the morally right position to adopt? These questions concern issues that are directly relevant to our own lives as well as those that are relevant to society more generally.

For these reasons, we will examine a number of contemporary moral issues from a philosophical perspective. We will address questions such as: Do animals have rights? Is eating meat morally wrong? Is abortion morally permissible? If so, under what conditions? What obligations, if any, do we have to the global poor? Would it morally right to genetically enhance ourselves or our children? Before examining these questions, the course introduces some influential ethical theories about what, in general, makes actions right and wrong.

The primary purpose of the course is to enable students to understand issues in health care ethics better, and to appreciate and evaluate the arguments on all sides, while attempting to form their own considered view. You can only test your views by subjecting them to criticism, so you will be expected to regularly participate in class discussion through the discussion board.

Required Course Materials:

<u>Note</u>: There is no required textbook for this course. All readings will be made available via eCampus.

Requirements:

- 1. <u>Readings & Lectures</u>: You are expected to complete each of the assigned readings and to watch the corresponding lecture videos posted online.
- Quizzes: Qnizzes will only be available to take during the week for which they are assigned. Each quiz has a time-limit (usually 4 minutes). <u>You cannot make up any missed quizzes</u>. However, there will be <u>twelve</u> quizzes; only your best <u>ten</u> will count toward the final grade.
- 3. Discussion Board: You will be required to post regularly on the Discussion Board. You are required to post at least <u>6 comments each week</u> on the discussion board. At least three of your comments each week should respond directly to one of the discussion prompts, and (ii) at least three of your comments should be replies to one of your classmates' comments.

<u>Note</u>: Discussion board comments should be thoughtful, respectful, and at least <u>4-6</u> sentences long). Discussion Board comments for each week must be completed by the end of Saturday in order to receive credit.

- 4. <u>Essay</u>: There will be one essay that requires you to critically evaluate one of the arguments we cover in the course. Instructions for the essay will be posted in advance.
- 5. <u>Exams</u>: There will be three multiple choice exams. Each exam will cover the material from one week of the course.
