Catalog Course Description

MUSC111 (Introduction to Music) is an introductory course designed to develop an appreciation and understanding of the significance of music as a fine art, and to help the student develop intelligent listening skills.

General Education Curriculum Objectives

This course is part of West Virginia University's General Education Curriculum. Course content is focused on:

- Objective 4: Contemporary Society methods of critical thought and principles of inquiry concerning contemporary issues, ideas, and/or values as seen from a humanistic or scientific perspective.
- Objective 5: Artistic Expression critical inquiry in music.

Course Description/Goals

Music is art as well as science. To be able to comprehend it to the fullest we must be able to appreciate both its emotional and intellectual content. The aim of this course is to provide you with the tools for a basic understanding of music. It will not make you a musician or teach you how to write music. It will, however, give you the necessary background to understand what is going on technically when you are listening to music, so that your experience is not limited to a wash of sound that produces a certain feeling. The course will concentrate on the development of an attentive style of listening, the introduction and systematic study of the building blocks of music, and enhancing awareness of the main musical styles of selected western and non-western cultures.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify and explain the basic elements of music.
- 2. Compare and contrast a variety of musical styles.
- 3. Clarify the merits of the many styles of music.
- 4. Evaluate music objectively.
- 5. Measure the different types of music within different cultures.
